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Arthur D. Pinsart 91, of Tulsa, OK prior resident of Pittsburg, KS died 9:00pm Friday May 29, 2020 at the Forest Hills Care Center of Tulsa, OK.

Arthur was born April 13, 1929 in Pittsburg, KS the son of Arthur and Mary (Daniux) Pinsart. Arthur grew up in Pittsburg, KS graduating from St. Mary's Colgan schools. He lived in Pittsburg until his late 20's before moving to Grove, OK.

On October 23, 1949 Arthur married Cecilia Ann Baldelli in Pittsburg, KS; she preceded him in death on July 21, 1988. He later married Alice Walz in Grove, OK; she preceded him in death in November of 2018. Arthur worked as a salesman for Metlife for 35 years.

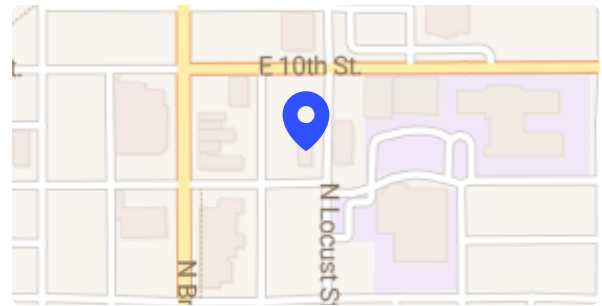

He would always tell the grand kids to keep our eyes closed when we went under but of course we never did. Our eyes would burn so bad for hours after the swim that we couldn't open them. He also had cable TV with that brown box and a cord that had to be at least 100' long haha. I remember he had video recorder too, we or at least I thought he was so rich to have one and cable TV. That video recorder had to weigh at least 30 pounds, he and MaGram would lug that thing to every school play, sit in the blistering sun all day for baseball games and spend their entire weekends in a stinky gym to video tape us in a wrestling tournament. The best was going to the lake though during the summer. We were lucky enough to have boat and holy cow did we spend some hours in it when we were little. We started out with a zippy board when we were little. Once we got a little older we learned how ski and I think there were days that we would be on the water all day only to come home and eat lunch and get back out on the water until dinner. I still have no idea how none of have skin cancer from all the sun. If we weren't on the boat we were most likely on the golf cart riding around with our BB guns looking for birds to shoot. I know it's bad but that's what we did. I don't think he really liked us shooting the birds but he never said anything. The 4th of July was always the best! I have no idea how much money he would spend on fire works but it was enough to keep 4 grand kids busy with black cats for days. Somehow Charlie would always burn himself with the punk at least half a dozen times and then at dark we would get the good stuff out it took hours to light it all. Later I remember learning how to drive a standard in his little ford ranger. On my senior prom he let take his Cadillac and I'm telling you I thought I was man driving that caddy! I loved to play golf with him and dad too, he would always want to show me off to all his buddies. He was always so proud of me, I felt that from him whenever we were together. Of course I didn't know it at the time but he shaped so much of my life. I think the most important thing he taught me is FAMILY, you can always count on family! I think of my childhood often and he was always there. It wont be easy to say good bye on Wednesday but I know that I'll have a tee time waiting when I see him again.
